Finally, if you have not paid for your Newsletter Ad please get with Nirmal or David to do so ASAP.


Thank you everyone and we look forward to the rest of the year. Be safe and see you at the next event in July!

The basics of Collagen

What is collagen?

Collagen is a fibrous component specific to the animal kingdom and crucial for organisms, as it is the basis of conjunctive tissues that provides support and connects organs. It accounts for one third of dry weight of all proteins in the human body and about three quarters of dry weight of the skin.

The term 'collagen' refers to a set of proteins classified into 28 different types, distinguished by their structure but also by their location in the body [1]. The most represented collagens in the skin are type I, III, IV, VI, VII and XVII. They are mainly synthesized by fibroblasts in the dermis and keratinocytes of the epidermal basal lamina for type VII collagen [2][3].

Regardless of the type, the basic unit of collagen is a motif of 3 repeated amino acids: one glycine associated with two other amino acids, frequently proline and hydroxyproline)[4]. They bond together and form an elegant triple helix, called "Procollagen", giving collagen a very high resistance and the ability to extend to about 90% of its original size, while still being able to regain its initial formation. Several collagen triple helices are then packed together side by side to form fibrils, then arrange themselves in different ways depending on the type of collagen [5].





Why is collagen deeply impacted by aging?

With intrinsic aging, the production of collagen slows down at the age of 30. The dermis, which structures the whole skin, is consequently less dense which leads to the weakening of superficial structures such as epidermis. With age, there is also a loss of elasticity, decreasing the density of the skin which creates the appearance of wrinkles.

In addition to the decrease of collagen synthesis, the fibers also undergo significant changes that affect their physical properties. These changes increase with age but can be intensified by extrinsic aging from exposure to UV rays, pollution, smoking and dietary imbalances. This results in an increase of matrix metalloproteinases (MMPs), the enzymes responsible for the degradation of collagens.

Inversely, there is also a <u>decrease in the synthesis and activity of metalloproteinase inhibitors</u>, or TIMPs (tissue inhibitors of metalloproteinases). Due to their long lifespan, collagens are the primary target for slow enzymatic reactions such as <u>glycation</u>. Glycation acts as a caramelization, stiffening the collagen fibers leading to loss of elasticity and sagging, traditional features of aged skin [6].

Finally, with age, there is accumulation of <u>reactive oxygen species</u> which generates oxidation

reactions. This results in the carbonylation of the amino acids lysine and arginine on collagen [7]. This carbonylation radically changes the visco-elastic property of collagens [8].

Supplement collagen from the inside out

In order to counteract this deficit of collagen in our body and skin, Collagen can be taken orally (supplement/food) or topically (skin care).

The differences between oral and topical use will be the efficacy and bioavailability. Orally, it goes in the bloodstream and is much more readily bioavailable, providing increased efficacy compared to a topical application that will have to go through the skin barrier.

Its use as a topical or oral supplement is often intended to prevent and reduce wrinkles, thicken hair, and strengthen nails.

In skin care, collagen is used mostly for its anti-aging properties, smoothing the skin relief, increasing its elasticity, and promoting hydration, from the outside.





Protect and stimulate the natural collagen content in the skin

Another approach is to help protect and boost the natural collagen content in the skin with skin care active ingredients that may be smaller than collagen molecules and can:

- Stimulate the synthesis of the natural collagen in order to counteract the decrease seen with age.
- Protect existing collagen from degradation or structural modification, which lead to the loss of their physicochemical properties.

Finally, actives can also stimulate the contractile capacities exerted by fibroblasts on the collagen fibers in the dermis, to obtain a localized tightening effect.


